He now imparts his extensive knowledge on economics, governance, and European and Nordic politics to audiences worldwide. Notably, he remains a staunch advocate for job creation and chairs the Extractive Industries Transparency Initiative, a crucial organisation dedicated to fostering good governance in the oil, gas, and mining sectors.
